About the project

Summary

Keele University sits in a campus of over 600 acres; its environment is an important part of its attraction to students and to staff working here. With its historic connections it is also a visitor attraction in its own right. My entry is for my 43 year study of the fauna and fauna here as well as promoting it to our students, staff and wider community.

Work has been carried out largely by myself with some help from Estates and a couple of colleagues.

The results

I see my role as being one of raising awareness of the importance of our environment and the need to conserve it. By doing this I hope to encourage people to act in a sustainable manner and with consideration to their surroundings. One major example is in the change in attitude to the management of our estate. Regard for wildlife is now a major consideration.

It is difficult to quantify the effect of my activities on people's sustainability behaviour, but feedback I have received from my regular Arboretum walks attended by people all across the university, suggest that they have influenced people through: increased considerations of wildlife in their own gardens; spreading knowledge to family and friends; increased appreciation for the natural environment; in addition to personal benefits such as enhanced personal wellbeing.

This has all led to a better appreciation of our environment here at Keele and hopefully generally too.
