

GREEN OFFICE MODEL: 5 CASES IN COMPARISON

BACKGROUND

Our current way of life is deeply unsustainable: Humanity consumes the resources of 1.8 planets. If present trends continue, we will need three planets by 2050. Creating a socially desirable and economically viable human civilization flourishing within planetary boundaries is the primary challenge of our time, the call of action for our generation. The necessary changes will not come easy or through technical fixes alone. On the contrary they require deep transformations in the way we think, live, travel, eat, vote and work.

We believe that it is the **responsibility of universities** as public institutions to be the engines of local, national and global sustainability transitions: Universities should educate students as sustainability change agents, create new knowledge to inform these transitions, and reduce the ecological and social footprints of running the organisation itself. Creating more sustainable universities requires dedicated change agents.

Students are oftentimes overlooked and side-lined within a university's sustainability efforts. We believe this is a missed opportunity, given the energy and spirit of students, the learning opportunities that sustainability engagement presents and the sheer size of the student body as largest stakeholder group on campus. Yet for a large number of students to unleash their full potential as sustainability change agents, the institutional support, resources and legitimacy of universities and governments are required.

As a **student-led and staff-supported sustainability hub**, the Green Office Model presents an internationally recognized and open-source model to structurally empower students. The first student-led and staff-supported Green Office was founded at **Maastricht University** in September 2010. The Green Office acts as a platform for students and staff running sustainability initiatives, improves the communication around these initiatives, coordinates the development and implementation of the university's sustainability strategy, and provides new impulses to create a buzz around sustainability.

What started as an experiment developed into an internationally recognized and awarded open-source model for sustainability governance at universities:

• In 2012, Maastricht University won the **Sustainabul Award** as the Dutch university with the most transparent sustainability efforts, thanks to the relentless efforts of students and staff in the Green Office.



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- Two Green Offices Maastricht and Exeter won the **Student Sustainability Award** of the International Sustainable Campus Network und oikos international two consecutive times, in 2012 and 2014.
- In 2013, the Green Office Model was recognized and recommended as a good practice by Uwe Schneidewind und Mandy Singer-Brodowski in their book "Transformative Science", and a report by the expert commission "Science for Sustainability" of the government of Baden-Württemberg, Germany.
- The Green Office Model was presented as a good practice on the UNESCO Education for Sustainable World Conference in Japan in 2014, and inspired the central recommendation of the UNESCO Education for Sustainable Youth Statement that universities and governments should provide structural support for student-led change processes.

rootAbility was established by co-founders of Maastricht University Green Office as a non-profit organisation in 2012, to create a growing community of Green Office Alumni that support the replication of the Green Office Model. We developed the 6 Green Office Principles, which form the basis of the model, and support students and staff in the adaptation of these principles to the context of their university. The Green Office Principles are freely available to everyone under a Creative Commons Licence. As a process facilitator, we deliver presentations, workshops and webinars, and provide guidance, inspiration, information and feedback for students and staff that want to write concept papers and funding application for their Green Offices.

Beginning of 2015, the Green Office Model has inspired student-led and staff-supported sustainability hubs at 10 universities in the Netherlands, Germany and the United Kingdom. Over 58 students and staff work for these Green Offices, which have a combined annual budget of 800 000 Euro. We support initiatives at universities across Sweden, Italy, the Netherlands, Germany and Great Britain in developing concept papers and funding applications for their Green Offices. In this sense, the Green Office Model gave rise to the growing and internationally active Green Office Movement. Goal of this movement is to engage over 10 000 students and staff in 100 Green Offices by 2025, in order to help transition universities, higher education sectors and societies towards sustainability. MAASTRICHT UNIVERSITY GREEN OFFICE

Maastricht University Green Office was established in September 2010 as the first student-led and staff-supported sustainability hub at a European university. The efforts of the Green Office were recognized with the Student Leadership Award by the International Sustainable Campus Network (ISCN) and oikos international in summer 2012. Through the efforts of the Green Office, Maastricht University also received the Sustainabul Award as the Dutch university with the most transparent sustainability efforts in 2012. rootAbility was also established by co-founders of the Green Office as a spin-off organisation in September 2012. 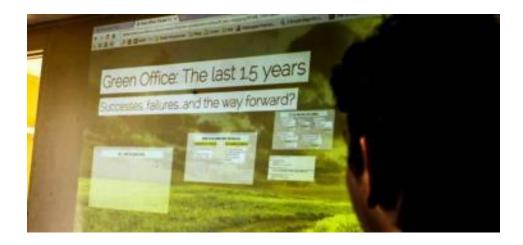

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GREEN OFFICE WAGENINGEN

The establishment of Green Office Wageningen at WageningenUR (University and Research Centre) was inspired by Maastricht University Green Office. Green Office Wageningen was established in September 2012. Green Office Wageningen in August 2014:

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GREEN OFFICE UTRECHT

Green Office Utrecht (GOU) was launched at Utrecht University in September 2013. It presents the third Green Office at a Dutch university and is also inspired by and modelled after Maastricht University Green Office. Green Office Utrecht by August 2014:

Students and One Manager Green Office (28hrs/week) coordinates the team, gives advice to the various project groups, handles the staff finances, implements projects and manages internal and external relations. The direct supervisor of the manager is the general director leading the general administration (algemene bestuursdienst) of the university. Three interns are working in the Green Office 12hrs/week. They receive a basic internship salary from Utrecht University. Different to the other Green Offices, the student interns do not work for a minimum of one year, but between 3-6 months in the Green Office. The interns can be students or recent graduates. [Note, by January 2015, the number of interns was increased to 6 students.] The interns are also working together with student volunteers. The numbers of student volunteers vary, approximately there are some forty volunteers working on several GOU- and student projects In August 2014, the three student interns fulfil the following roles: Communication: Running the website, newsletter, social media presence, poster campaigns in order to get the GOU known and to build a community. Projects: This position is the contact person for the students that want to volunteer or implement their own projects. The position also implements GOU sustainability projects. Policy & transparency: bridges the gap between the University's sustainability policy and the reality of students and coworkers. This position tries to engage students and employees with the sustainability goals set by the UU [Note: With the addition of three new interns, the working structure of Green Office Utrecht was changed. The Green Office now has six coordinators working on: Activities, Campaign, Digital communication, Offline communication, Project Support, and Living Lab.] Mandate Vision: Green Office Utrecht is the central hub where fresh minds and hands come together to support Utrecht University's sustainable development.





	- Mission: Green Office Utrecht achieves its vision by making the university's policy tangible in the everyday reality of its students and staff members by informing, involving and empowering them to act.		
Top 3 Projects	The GOU manages its own projects or assists students and student organisations in realising their project ideas, for instance by connecting them to relevant stakeholders within the university. Three of the projects that the GOU has implemented successfully:		
	- Selecta: Collaboration with the company owning the vending machines. Stickers placed on the vending machines that if you use your own cup you get 11 cents off.		
	- Monthly brainstorming sessions : A person working on sustainability issues poses a question or problem he or she is struggling with. The 15-30 students and staff who are attending the session on average brainstorm on a solution to this problem.		
	- Living Lab: students of the Master Sustainable Development, following the course Energy & Resource Efficiency, have done research on how the University Administration (Universitaire Bestuursdienst) can make its activities more sustainable. The following topics have been covered: Plastic Recycling at the Uithof, ICT improvements, a review of implementations, Energy Efficient building of new Installations at the Uithof, Improving Water Use at the Uithof, Greening the Introduction Week.		
Resources	 GOU received funding for two years, from September 2013 until August 2015. In total, the University of Utrecht invests around 54 000 Euro per year into the Green Office, including a working budget and salaries. 		
	- The Green Office has a 90m2 office space for which it does not need to pay rent.		
Integration	- GOU is part of the general administration (algemene bestuursdienst). The GO manager has weekly meetings with the sustainability advisor of the university, who is not officially integrated into the Green Office.		
	 The university has a Sustainability Project Group – which initiated the Green Office – and discusses the sustainability strategy for the university. Members of the group include the energy and sustainability coordinators, the general director, staff from the communication department and a director of research and education. The group meets once per month. The Green Office is not officially integrated into this group. The ambition is also that the Green Office will receive an Advisory Board that should include six members and meet the 		

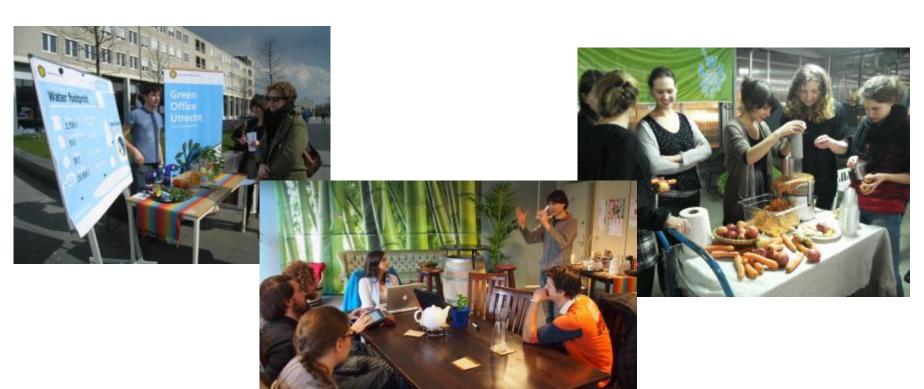

Collaboration	-	Among others the Green Office works together with student groups, the university's communication department, the
		Sustainability Project Group, the catering company, as well as relevant course coordinators and researchers.
Training	-	One workshop with rootAbility to determine the vision and mission of GOU

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GREENWICH SUSTAINABILITY HUB

Greenwich Sustainability Hub – alongside the Students' Green Unit at the University of Exeter – were both established in October 2013. Both projects are externally financed through the Students' Green Fund by the Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE). Between 2013 and 2015, HEFCE granted 5million British pounds to the National Union of Students to invest in student-led sustainability projects in England (www.studentsgreenfund.org.uk). The Greenwich Sustainability Hub has been inspired by Maastricht University Green Office and rootAbility assisted in writing the funding proposal. Greenwich Sustainability Hub by August 2014:

Students and staff	 6 student interns for a minimum of one year (on a flexible zero hour contract working a maximum of 20 hrs./week) A full-time employee has been hired as coordinator of the GSH. In this sense, no existing staff member was integrated into the unit, but a new employee hired as full-time coordinator. The coordinator meets with the university's sustainability team about once every fortnight. In the first year, the GSH was internally organised into the following project teams (Stand June 2014). These roles will change in the next academic year. Events and Campaigns (1 student), Green Impact (3 students), Education and Training (2 students)
Mandate	 GSH is a central point for students who want to get involved with and learn more about sustainability issues. It's mission is: To create sustainable and positive environmental behaviors amongst students, businesses and the wider community through collaborative programs and projects; To improve the employability of our students and students in our partnering institutions; To promote Greenwich as a center for sustainable tourism;
	- To enable students' to have a bigger impact on their University and community.
Top 3 Projects	 Events: Student engagement through events, opportunities and activities including Green Week and the annual Sustainability Show. Outreach to businesses: The GSH supports businesses to achieve Green Impact Enterprise environmental accreditation.





	-	Green Impact is an environmental accreditation scheme that was developed by the National Union of Students and is now implemented at universities, colleges, public authorities and enterprises throughout the UK. Outreach to schools: The GSH organises workshops on education for sustainable development tailored to local schools.
Funding	-	Funding is guaranteed for two years through the Students' Green Fund (www.studentsgreenfund.org.uk/about). The total grant for the two years is £171,572. To guarantee the legacy of the project, the GSH aims to make income from some elements of the project to enable the GSH to become self-financing, as well as sourcing additional investment from the University of Greenwich.
Integration	-	Different to the other Green Offices in the Netherlands, the GSH is an integrated unit into the Students' Union and jointly managed by the Students' Union University of Greenwich (SUUG) and the University of Greenwich Sustainability Team. The GSH coordinator reports to the Membership Service Manager in SUUG and the Head of Sustainability at the University of Greenwich.GSH has a Steering Group of key staff from SUUG and the University of Greenwich Sustainability Team. GSH also reports on a quarterly basis to the GSH Advisory Group (12 members including representatives from the senior management within the University of Greenwich and SUUG, student representatives, and external representatives from the Royal Borough of Greenwich, Partner Colleges and NUS).
Collaboration	-	Among other, GSH works together with the Students' Union, clubs and societies, and the university's sustainability team. Given the explicit external focus of GSH, the unit mainly works together with outside stakeholders, including local schools and companies.
Training	-	The GSH team received the following trainings: Induction and Sustainability Knowledge Themes where incoming student interns had to familiarize themselves with a sustainability topic; 3 x Rootability Workshops. Topics covered include Project Management; Sustainability in Higher Education, Communication and Stakeholder Engagement; Reflection and learning from experience); Public Speaking Training; Train the Trainer Training; Green Impact Project Assistant Training; Green Impact Auditor Training





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STUDENTS' GREEN UNIT

The Students' Green Unit (SGU) at the University of Exeter was also established in October 2013 and receives external funding through the Students' Green Fund. The Students' Green Unit by August 2014:

Students and	-	Different to the other Green Offices, the SGU does not employ students, but five graduate employees working full-time
staff		40hrs/week. These graduate employees are organised into in five portfolios: Education (1 graduate employee); Research (1

	-	A staff member of the Students' Guild supervises the SGU.
	-	Different to the other Green Offices, the SGU puts a strong emphasis that the graduate employees support student
		volunteers in implementing their projects, rather than implementing projects by themselves. At the beginning of the
		academic year, students submitted a proposal for a sustainability project that they want to implement. Then, 18 projects
		were selected and a budget was allocated to each project. Each staff member of the SGU supervises between 2-4 student
		projects. The staff and students meet with when is necessary, this often is weekly but can be fortnightly- it depends on
		student project updates and developments.
	-	The funding allocated depends on the nature of the project. The range is between £500- £1500 per project. Each project
		varies in numbers, some projects are led my society members- in these occasions there can be around 4 or 5 students
		managing a project. We have a couple of projects which are led by individual students.
Mandate	-	The SGU contributes to the ongoing sustainability strategy of the University of Exeter and enables students to become
		change-agents for sustainability.
Top 3 Projects	Th	e following three projects are managed by volunteers of the SGU, supported by the graduate employees:
	-	The Food Pile Up: Using tinned items to represent the wasted food from 3 halls of residence over the course of a week (in
		total 1 tonne of food), the Food Pile up was held in the main Forum Street to show students and staff how much food gets
		wasted. The tinned food was then donated to the local food bank to help families and individuals in need.
	-	Going Wildwards: Carrying on from the biodiversity work that the University is already doing, this project looks at engaging



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	students to interact with the campus. This is being done through nature walks, putting up door mice boxes, working in the Community Garden and creating a series of maps that documents all of the eco-hot spots on campus. - ExBags: 2 students have designed reusable jute bags to be sold at the SGU end of year showcase and during Fresher's week in September. This is to try and reduce the amount of plastics bags that is used on campus.
Resources	 150 000 £ per year for two years Funding is guaranteed for two years through the Students' Green Fund managed by the National Union of Students UK (www.studentsgreenfund.org.uk/about)
Integration	 Different to the other Green Offices in the Netherlands, the SGU is an integrated unit into the Students' Guild. The SGU is overviewed by a Project Review Board that meets once a quarter. The board is made up of the sustainability manager of the university, the chief executive of the Guild, sabbatical officers and academics. This is to review the SGU's performance and to ensure the student projects are reaching a large number of students across the university. The SGU also attends the meetings of the Sustainability Advisory Group, which is useful for the team to be aware of what is going on regarding sustainability across the university.
Collaboration	- SGU mainly works together with all stakeholders that are relevant to implement the projects of the student volunteers. This includes among others the university's sustainability team, the estates departments, researchers and lecturers, local companies, schools and civil society organisations, as well as the National Union of Students UK.
Training	 2 full days of training from Ambios (http://www.ambios.net/) 1 full day of training from rootAbility for the SGU team, and their project leaders Training from the Activities and Volunteering team from Exeter Students' Guild, specifically relating to event management

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
