### **Lancaster University – Edible Campus**





- •22 food growing spaces installed across campus including:
  - The Ecohub: home to 200m<sup>2</sup> growing space and a flock of exbattery chickens
  - three large herb gardens in central campus
  - a large growing box in each of our nine college's social spaces
  - a P.Y.O. fruit gardens featuring 300 fruiting shrubs on the main campus thoroughfare



### **Lancaster University – Edible Campus**





- Over 1200 students and staff involved each year
- •Community groups, international partners and schools regularly visit
- Food supplied to student businesses and campus catering
- Spaces also now used for teaching and research

- Increased funding opportunity






















Strengths	<ul> <li>Engaged network of students</li> <li>Student leaders have influence on student behaviour and are more aware of what engages students</li> <li>Provider of nearly all extra-curricular activity</li> <li>Strong communications</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Dedicated staff team with specific skills, knowledge and expertise;</li> <li>Direct influence on University's own environmental performance;</li> <li>Responsible for campus design</li> </ul>
Weaknesses	<ul> <li>Student leaders have little experience;</li> <li>Many other priorities within the Union, including the prioritisation of student experience above environmental performance/behaviours</li> <li>Student led activity not always professional</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Slow decision making processes;</li> <li>Distance from student body;</li> <li>Limited funding models</li> </ul>

#### **Lessons Learnt**





- Clear communication of expectations
- Collaborate to regularly develop your goals and vision of what might be achieved
- Be flexible
- Have open avenues of communication
- Remember that each partner has different success/failure criteria
